OPEN SEASON ON GROUSE, PARTRIDGE ANNOUNCED

G.E. McKinnon, District Forester has announced the open season for ruffed grouse, spruce partridge, sharp-tailed grouse and ptarmigan for the 1962 season.

The following is applicable for this district:-

Ruffed Grouse and Spruce Partridge may be hunted from September 15th to December 15th, both dates inclusive. No person shall take in one day an aggregate number of ruffed grouse and spruce partridge exceeding five, and no person shall have in his possession at any one time an aggregate number exceeding fifteen.

Sharp-tailed Grouse and Ptarmigan may be hunted from September 15th to December 15th, both dates inclusive. In addition, that portion of the District within the Cochrane Territorial District and the portion lying north of the 11th base line has an extended closing date to March 31st, 1963, for sharp-tailed grouse and ptarmigan.

The daily limit for sharp-tailed grouse is five and the possession limit fifteen at one time.

Daily limit for ptarmigan - five. Possession limit - total of fifteen.

PARKS

The sale of campsite permits show a slight decline compared with sales made to this date one year ago. This is probably due to the recent inclement weather.

The comparison is as follows:-

FOREST FIRE RATINGS (Toronto)

Four-alarm fires are for city folk - forest fires are rated differently. By being familiar with fire danger ratings in forest areas and taking proper safety precautions, travellers, anglers, vacationists and others can do much to prevent costly and extensive fires.

Ratings posted through the forest fire district during the April to October fire season indicate whether the danger is moderate, high or extreme. Here's what they mean.

MODERATE - Fires will start from an open flame, burn briskly and spread.

HIGH - Fires start rapidly from an open flame, glowing cinders, cigarette butt etc., spread rapidly and tend to crown in suitable fuels.

EXTREME - Fires start readily from sparks, burn fiercely, crown and spot generally, and are unusually difficult to control during the heat of the day.

All these forest fire danger warnings demand immediate attention. Fire danger increases in warm, dry weather.

The Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests, with ground crews, air patrols and more than 300 lookout towers, is trying to preserve forests, fish & wildlife from destruction by fire for the enjoyment and economic benefit of Ontario people and the thousands who visit the province annually. Public co-operation is essential to successful fire detection, prevention and control.
