ANNUAL FLOWER SHOW SUCCESSFUL

Summer Showtime -- and as always at this time of the year, the Terrace Bay Horticultural Society presented their eighth annual Flower and Vegetable Show. Despite the grumblings on a poor season, by local gardeners, the Highschool Auditorium appeared full of bright flowers and healthy - looking vegetables. Judge of the show, Mr. Neil Duncan of Port Arthur termed it, "The best I've seen here in the past three years of judging".

High aggregate winner of the entire show with a total of 155 points was Mr. Albert Farrow, who besides the many individual prizes took home the Wills Nursery Trophy, the Township's award of a load of topsoil, the Neil Duncan Award for the best single Spike in the gladioli division, the Chicoine Award as Class three-Bi-annuals aggregate, Class five -- Dahlias aggregate for the Don's Painting and Decorating Award, Class six, Gladiolus Aggregate for the Bournes' Nursery Award, and the Eaton's Trophy for high aggregate in all Flower Divisions.

An award, started last season by Mr. John Ferrier, the New Exhibitors Award, went this year to Mr. George Buhrmann who attained a total of 29 points, the highest aggregate amongst exhibitors entering the show for the first time.

Judges Award went to Mrs. L.K. Williams for her Swede Turnips and with many words of praise from Judge Neil Duncan on their exceptionally high quality and nary a blemish, and second place was won by Leslie Ann Cotton for her Collection of Wild Flowers, Pressed and Mounted, Junior (Continued on Page 11)
