Mr. Nelson was predeceased by his wife in 1940 and is survived by three sons: Charles, of Red Rock, Albert of Fort William, and Allan of Schreiber; three daughters, Mrs. Annie Minoletti of Port Arthur, Hilda (Mrs. Sydney Daley) of Hailebury, and Evelyn (Mrs. Joseph Lark) of Fort William. Also 16 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren survive.

He was born in Kamfors, Sweden and came to Schreiber in 1911 where, until his retirement in March 1942, he was employed with the CPR carpentry department.

Mr. Nelson, who was "Pa" to all ages in Schreiber, had won a special niche in the town life. In earlier years dancing was his favorite pastime and his nimble feet were the envy of many younger people. In later years his treasure house of anecdotes, coupled with sly asides, humorous but pointed, became the delight of not only his family but the old friends privileged to visit in his home where he lived alone with fierce independence until his death.

He was a member of St. Andrew's Church and for many years its mainstay for alterations and repairs, as well as serving on the various boards. He also belonged for many years to the IOOF.

CONSERVATION TROPHY FOR YOUTH GROUPS

Toronto—Keen interest among Ontario's young people's groups interested in conservation is reported in the competition for the special youth groups conservation trophy originated by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests. The handsome trophy, presented by Lands and Forests Minister the Hon. J.W. Spooner to the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, is open for competition by all conservation-minded youth groups.

"The Department of Lands and Forests has been interested in advancing conservation principles and practices among our young people," the Minister said in presenting the trophy. "To develop conservation further among our youth groups, the Department is providing this trophy to be awarded by the Federation of Anglers and Hunters annually to the youth group which it feels has made the greatest contribution to conservation during the year. All youth groups, large and small, throughout Ontario are eligible."

Each year's winner will retain the trophy for one year and a smaller memento of the group's achievement will be retained by it permanently. Youth clubs interested in obtaining forms should secure them from Mr. Viv. Sutton, Secretary-manager of the Federation, Box 370, Ridgetown, Ontario.

SAFETY AWARDS PRESENTED TO C.P.R. EMPLOYEES

These awards have been devised by the Industrial Accident Prevention Association of Ontario, with the intent of protecting both employee and arousing his interest in self-protection, and of course, as in the instance of travel services, of protecting the public.

Each stamp, at the bottom of plaque, represents a year in which the department named has been free from ranking injuries for one year and thus are highly prized.

Supt. V.E. Everitt spoke with appreciation of the satisfaction and encouragement he and the other officers of the Company experience when such awards are won, vital evidence of the men's pride and interest in their work.
