MACHINE TENDER LOSES HAND AT MARATHON

On Friday at 10.20 P.M. the Machine Tender of No.2 Pulp Kraft Machine had his hand caught in the nip point of the mold and press roll and his hand and arm were drawn through up to a point several inches above the wrist.

The hand was badly mangled and it was found necessary to amputate the hand and portion of the arm a distance above the wrist. The injured man was efficiently and commendably rendered assistance. Within a period of ten minutes he had been administered First Aid, examined by Dr. C.H.J.Reason briefly at the site of the accident and taken to the Wilson Memorial Hospital by the Mill ambulance, Time of admittance at the hospital was 10.30 P.M.

The injured man, wishing to take the opportunity of checking the wire facing of the mold roll of his Machine while it was down had signalled to the Machine Tender of No.1 Machine by raising and lowering both his hands in front of his body, to slow the mold roll down so as to check it by letting the face of the roll run against the palm of his hand while he pressed it against the roll.

The No.1 Machine Tender interpreted this signal to mean to lower the roll and went over and turned the control lever, which controls the compressed air that raises and lowers the press roll, to the down position. In the meantime the injured man had placed the palm of his hand against the roll, while leaning across the smooth roll and the hot water spray pipe, and had started checking the mesh wire facing when the press roll descended. His hand was caught in the nip of the mold and the press roll and it and his arm were drawn through.

The signals to slow down and to lower are quite similar and it is felt this is the reason for the misinterpretation. The signal to slow down is a movement in front of the body of the hands up and down from the wrists, while the signal to lower is a dropping of both hands in front of the body with movement taking place from the elbows.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITIES
