HUNTERS WARNED TO BE CAREFUL

Hunters and others in the woods from now until the snow falls are cautioned to be extremely careful with their smoking materials and lunch fires. Fall can produce serious forest fires, the great majority of them due to human carelessness, forest protection officers of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests warn. They strongly recommend observance of these fire safety rules: - Don't smoke while walking in the woods. Sit down to smoke - and extinguish your smoking material on rock or mineral soil before moving on. Carry a thermos. If you have to light a lunch fire, pick a safe spot, keep the fire small and drown it with water before you leave.
