WILDLIFE FEDERATION (Continued from page 1) Supplementing the present projects of the Provincial groups in the fields of firearm and water safety, landowner-sportsman relations, habitat improvement, new species introduction, predator control, wilderness area preservation, and above all the encouragement of good sportsmanship practices will be some of the major objectives of the Canadian Federation.


Campaigns to promote more hcalthful outdoor activity participation by Canadian adults will be instituted. Special emphasis will be placed on encouraging the natural interest of the nation's youth in our wildlife and to help instill in them the principles of good sportsmanship.

The Head Office of the Federation will be established in Ottawa and authority for hiring an Executive Director will be delegated by the Convention. A closing dinner will be held Saturday evening and it is expected that Hon. Walter Dinsdale, Minister of Northern Affairs and Natural Resources will address the Federation "Founding Fathers". The Ottawa Convention is considered by all responsible Canadian sportsmen to be the most important milestone in the history of this country's conservation movement. Many contend that the long range benefits of the Canadian Wildlife Federation make this occasion comparable to the birth of the national labour or farm movements.
