

for better management. These sections are controlled by an Executive body of representatives from various clubs within the section. It is the duty of this executive to foster figure skating within its limits and to assist all clubs in matters pertaining to this only 'amateur sport'.

Once a year, approximately two weeks prior to the "Canadian Figure Skating Championships" a pre-determined Club, within these sections across Canada, plays host to a Sectional Championship. At their conclusion Senior Event winners are informed that they may enter the Canadian Championships <u>in a Junior event</u> of their choice.

This may seem a long drawn-out affair but it has proved to the Figure Skating world that Canadian Skaters are indeed 'the best in their class. you will notice on the ice surface during some events four people. Three of these are C.F.S.A.Judges, the fourth a C.F.S.A.Referee. These Judges are all Canadian Championship Panel personnel and will be marking skaters according to instructions laid down in the C.F.S.A.Rule Book and the Int<sup>9</sup>1. Skating Union Rule Book.

After each contestant has skated the Referee will ask for marks and, as we are using the "OPEN MARKING" system, you will see them hold up a card with a numeral on its surface. The BLACK NUMERAL will signify the whole portion of the tark given and the RED NUMERAL will signify the percentage portion given by that Judge on the figure skated: e.g., if the Judge holds up a Black numeral 4 and a Red numeral 3, he has given the skater a total mark of 4.3 on the specific figure.
