PULP AND PAPER INDUSTRY SETS NEW RECORDS Output of Canada's pulp and paper industry once again reached a new high in 1962, states R.M.Fowler, president of the Canadian Pulp & Paper Association, in a year-end review. Production was some 3% above 1961, reflecting increased total shipments both in Canada and to export markets. It appears that 1963 will be another year of moderate growth, with the possibility of a total increase of about the same order as in 1962. Final 1962 figures are expected to show newsprint production marginally lower than in 1961. However, total shipments were slightly higher, with increases to the domestic market, the United States and Britain more than offsetting declines in some overseas areas, principally South America and the Far East. Output of paperboard reached an alltime high, up some 12% from 1961. Production of book and writing papers was also at a new wrapping papers increased some 5% and output of specialty papers rose some 13%, both reaching new records.

\$800 MILLION TAR SANDS PERMIT APPLICATIONS This article is too lengthy to reproduce in its entirety. We list briefly a few highlights; More than \$800 million in capital investment is represented by applications made so far for permits to engage in commercial development of the fabulous Athabasca bituminous sands. One permit has been granted to Great Can. Oil Sands Ltd., with estimated capital cost of \$125 million. The second and largest project occupied two days of hearings and is the plan of Cities Service Athabasca Inc., for a \$360 million capital outlay. The third application was filed by Shell Oil Co. of Canada Ltd, in a surprise move the day before the Cities Service hearing opened (Jan. 14) with a projected cost of \$260 million.
