EDUCATION WEEK - MARCH

In the past one week in each year has been designated "Education Week" -- the dates chosen by the Provincial Governments. For the first time in history all ten provinces will join in its observance.

The theme chosen this year is "HOW ADOUT TEACHING?" To honour the teachers of the Province and to present the teaching profession to the students of Ontario as one of their primary career choices are the aims of the Education Week Committee this year.

Teaching is one of the most challenging, exciting and rewarding careers a young man or woman can choose. It brings dignity of position in a community; it gives the security of steady employment and provides a comfortable income. It brings the most important reward of all -- the sense of doing a job that is meaningful and of great purpose. Between now and 1970 Canada will need thousands of new qualified teachers in all classrooms from primary school to University; the possibilities within the teaching profession are unlimited for students of high academic and personal qualifications. It may be hackneyed, but it is nevertheless true to say that Canada's future lies in the minds, in the hearts and in the skill of the teachers in her classrooms.

It's true that more and more young people are preparing to teach, but rising enrolments in our schools are creating new openings every year. Look at communities you know. Count the number of new teachers this year.

Teaching is a job for experts. In the early grades the teacher needs knowledge in child development as well as a broad background in many subject areas. In later grades, teaching positions tend to be more specialized and varied.

DO YOU HAVE A SPECIAL INTEREST IN SCIENCE? IN SPORTS? IN HISTORY? IN MUSIC? DO YOU LIKE LANGUAGES? -- OR MATHEMATICS? -- ART OR MECHANICS? You can pursue your interest by choosing your teaching specialty.

Young people in this district no longer have to go to Eastern Ontario or out of the Province for advanced education. A Teachers! College and College offering University courses are now established in Port Arthur.

After considerable discussion it was moved and passed that the Terrace Bay Chamber of Commerce should not get involved in listing tourist rooms this year. The motion was strenuously opposed by J. Adamo who made the suggestion that Motel operators and Hotel Manager arrange a meeting to discuss ways of handling the situation.
