OPEN SEASONS FOR ANGLING

judging by current weather one wonders if the old saying "If Winter Comes - can Spring be far behind" is true. The Department of Lands and Forests believe it is and have announced angling seasons for 1963 as follows: Smallmouth Bass - June 29th to November 30th. Walleyes (Yellow Pickerel) - May 15th to April 14th. Lake Superior no closed season. Both specie limits are six in one day. Brook Trout (Speckled Trout) - May 1st to September 15th. Limit ten (10) pounds plus one brook trout or fifteen brook trout, whichever is the lesser.

Northern Pike - no closed season - six in one day.

Lake Trout - No closed season, except that portion of the District which falls within the Cochrane Territorial District January 1st to October 15th. Limit five in one day. Maskinonge - June 20th to November 30th. Limit two in one day, not less than 28 inches in length.

Rainbow Trout - May 1st to September 15th.

Five in one day.

Sturgeon - Lake Superior - no closed season. All other waters June 15th to May 14th. Limit one in one day.

Possession limit shall not exceed one day's

catch.
