## NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO HOCKEY PLAYOFFS

Midget Hockey held the spotlight in the Northwestern Ontario Playoffs here over the weekend—Terrace Bay Midgets emerging Champions over the Port Arthur Midgets with two to one and six to one victories in the total goal, two-game series.

They played the first game Saturday, finishing up Sunday afternoon and were presented the O'Toole Trophy by Forbes Cruickshanks, President of the Minor Hockey League.

Both clubs played a tight, even game in the first contest, neither team flashing the red light in the first period. Frank Schock finally opened the scoring in the early minutes of the second. Stapleton put Port Arthur in the running after five minutes of play in the third only to have Byerly set the Terrace Bay squad up one goal for the series two minutes later.

The second game showed a wider bridge in the scoring department but not in the play, Seaman making the only Port Arthur Counter late in the second period. Bereza in the Port Arthur net was outstanding in the first game but Terrace Bay seemed to get his number in the second and ran up a one, two, three period scoring.
