A record entry of 96 rinks from as far east as Wawa, to Winnipeg in the West, and Duluth in the U.S. competed for the coveted Birks Stitt 1st event, which consisted of \$500 in prizes. In winning this event, the ladies are now proud possessors of diamond studded Elgin wrist watches, miniature trophies and the beautiful Birks Stitt Trophy.

The local girls won 6 straight defeating rinks from the F.W. Curladrome, F.W. Curling Club, P.A. Country Club, Dryden, Kenora, and Corrine Wainio's rink from the Hill City Club of Port Arthur in the final game on Sunday.

We understand this is the first time this Bonspiel has been won by a rink outside of the Lakehead and it was particularly gratifying for Peggy and Ann who have been competing in this Bonspiel for the past 11 years. Last year they won the 3rd Event and have in previous years captured the 2nd and 4th events as well.
