The present By-Law on Garages and Service Stations was read, also copy of letter sent to the two Service Stations last May. Councillor Adamo reiterated his demand for a change in the by-law or enforcement of it. Reeve Heenan explained the reasoning which established the present By-Law, and with the stipulation on no stock piling of old or junk cars, Council discussed the possibility of relinquishing their existing restrictions.

A complaint was registered from Councillor Adamo that the promised Recreation budget had not been published. Representatives on the committee, Councillors Wellings and Valiguette stated a three-man committee were= at work on it. Councillor Wellings answered Councillor Valiguette concerning street cleaning, stating it would be done as soon

s conditions permit.

The Reeve brought Councillor Adamo up to date on their discussions during his absence of the parking problem around the Churches. Now that Lent was over, the Reeve felt the problem existed for only one hour a week and that no driver would proceed through a line of parked cars at a hazardous speed. Visibility had been last winter and he would see the snow blower was used on the streets next winter. He requested Councillors bring in recommendations on the Parking By-Law for the next meeting.

Due to a change in work hours Councillor Valiquette would be unable to attend afternoon Recreation meetings and it was agreed he change with Councillor Adamo, taking over his liason with the Chamber of Commerce, Public Relations and Town Planning.
