These premises are being used as a public thoroughfare because of a need for an access route from Selkirk to Simcoe Plaza and Kenogami district. Besides the danger to kiddies and baby carriages, there is also the annoyance to our motel, service station and garage customers.

Your defeatist attitude toward this situation demonstrated an alarming lack of concern for the safety of the people, the motorists and for the elimination of these hazards from the operation of our business.

Your advice to us that we post no trespassing signs and prosecute the offenders is

totally unfair to us and to the people. You leave us no alternative but to adopt these drastic steps in order to protect ourselves against accidents and subsequent liability. The serious consequences will be that men, women, children and baby carriages will be using the highway. This thought scares me. The fact that you do not foresee the more terrible hazards of such a course leaves us at a loss to describe your lack of common sense. This would be plain stupidity.

A side walk along the highway is essential. Your remarks about spending money on private property for a sidewalk is nonsensical. The owner of the property should be the one concerned about having a walk built on his property and if he would be willing to allow such, then you should jump at the chance. Here again your lack of interest is manifested by the fact that such a walk does not have to be on private property. Investigation will show that there is ample room for a sidewalk at a safe distance from the highway and we are sure that permission for such a construction could be obtained. You assume quite a lot when you say people would not use this walk.

We cannot understand how a group of people, who are employed by a company who has always shown a high regard for safety by displaying safety signs everywhere can sit back and ignore the hazards that threaten the welfare of our community. May the gods protect us from your complacency!

It is with utmost sincerity and much hesitation that I publish this letter to you but my duty to the company I represent and my anxiety for the safety of the people leaves me no alternative. I sincerely hope that you will review the situation and take the neces - sary steps to correct it.
