COUNCIL QUOTES

Council met Monday evening in the Municipal Chambers, presided over by the Reeve, Mr. J.P. Heenan. Councillors Valiquette, Fraser and Wellings heard the minutes of the past meeting and correspondence, read by Secretary W.F. Strutt.

A Schreiber resident sought permission to erect motel-style cabins, service station and restaurant within the municipality and itemized plans to be completed over a six year period. Reeve Heenan informed Council it appeared a tentative agreement had been reached with the Department of Lands and Forests to purchase this Crown land. He would procure the plans from the applicant for study by Council, making it clearly understood there would be no services provided by the Municipality and that, under the existing By-Law, only a Service Station and not a Garage could be erected.

A payment of \$1150, as twenty-five percent of the 1962 Road Allowance was received from the Department of Highways. The Northwestern Ontario Development Association sought membership from the Town at 10¢ per capita tax.

Application for the position of Dog Catcher from James Sweet was accepted by Council.

A letter from the Attorney General notified Council of the findings of Coroner Dr.
C.H.Reason of Marathon and jurors at the
Inquest into the death of Henry Thomas Duriez.
The death was termed accidental and completely exonerated the driver. Recommendations
were made that the Chief of Police and Town
Council take means to caution against sliding
on roadways. Council deliberated on the
recommendations, agreeing too many road
signs caused complacency and decided to
print cautioning letters to parents in the
paper next winter, with the Chief of Police
to follow up these cautions.

The Fire Report from Chief R.H. Hofland listed two fires during April.—one caused by construction workers on an addition to a Motel and the second commended the three boys involved who, though causing the fire while camping, had remained at the scene to put it out. Regular fire practice had been held and Hydrants blown out. The Department expected Mr. L.Cottenden in town next month when presentation of their Award would be made. The Fire Chief listed replacements while he would be on vacation and included a request for further supplies. Councillor Fraser would investigate these requests. Councillor Wellings reported further on the Hydrants.

Public Library account of \$175.54, Hydro Account of \$11,171.04, Town Account of \$55,341.65 and Recreation account of \$5,513.80 were completely discussed before passing for payment. Reeve Heenan remarked they still had not received the combined financial statement from (Continued Page 10)
