

LIFE SAVING EQUIPMENT REGULATIONS: - The following item is taken from the Northern Ontario Tourist Outfitters Association Bulletin. On April 5th, Secretary-Manager Bob Giles attended a meeting in Ottawa called by the Department of Transport to discuss Section 20A of a Small Vessel Regulations which reads; 20A. Every vessel propelled solely by oars or paddles shall carry; (a) in the case of a vessel not over 18 feet: in length, one bailer and one approved small vessel lifejacket or approved life saving cushion for each person on board, (b) in the case of a vessel over 18 feet in length, one bailer and one approved small vessel lifejacket for each person on board. Applications for exemption from this regulation were made and after some discussion the Department stated it would render a decision on the matter in the near future. We have now received a letter from the Department that they are taking action to rescind Section 20A. This means that persons using canoes, rowboats etc., propelled by oars or paddles will not be required to have life saving equipment.
