the Recreation Committee. Replying to enquiries from Council the Secretary noted they had been ready for the Auditors since February and had received no word on their delay.

Council discussed the adoption of the By-Law for the joint use of telephone poles with the Telephone Company. The Town still has some transformers to sell.

Reeve Heenan reported on a meeting he held that day with Mr. Millback of the Municipal Employees Compensation Board together with local Municipal employees. He further reported on negotiations to purchase back property from the Bell Telephone Company to complete business frontage and the adjacent canopy.

Council discussed at length purchase of a spraying and fogging machine which could be used locally when and where needed. Councillor Wellings was authorized to look into the matter when he is in Toronto this week.

Councillor Valiquette reported at length on the prepared Police Budget and announced there had been three applications to date for the position of Police Constable. He also reported on the town tour he had taken as liason with the Chamber of Commerce and Council would, in due course, receive their recommendations for spring clean-up campaign.

Councillor Fraser enquired into the repairs of broken curbing in front of a new home and also into proposed curbing for the Cemetery. Council agreed to have tenders placed for the latter and Councillor Wellings would look into both items. Councillor Wellings proposed they revise their Cemetery costs.

Complaints had been registered with Councillor Valiquette on the idling of diesel trucks overnight at the White Rose Service Station, disturbing homeowners adjacent to the Highway. This will be investigated, also the parking of large trucks on the Highway in front of the Recreation Centre blocking the view at the corner. Signs will be erected to keep the corner clear.
