SIR MARTIN FROBISHER STAMP ANNOUNCED

Details of a new commemorative five-cent postage stamp, in the explorer series, to honour Sir Martin Frobisher, were revealed today by the Hon. Azellus Denis, Postmaster General. The stamp will be released on July 29th.

Mr. Denis stated that the new stamp, designed by Philip Weiss of Ottawa, is an intermediate sized horizontal and will be printed in blue.

A portrait of Sir Martin will appear in the left foreground and, in the right background, the outline of a sailing ship of the 16th century is silhouetted against an iceberg. Mr. Denis added that the meridian lines which taper toward the top of the stamp are intended to suggest the Northern Hemisphere.

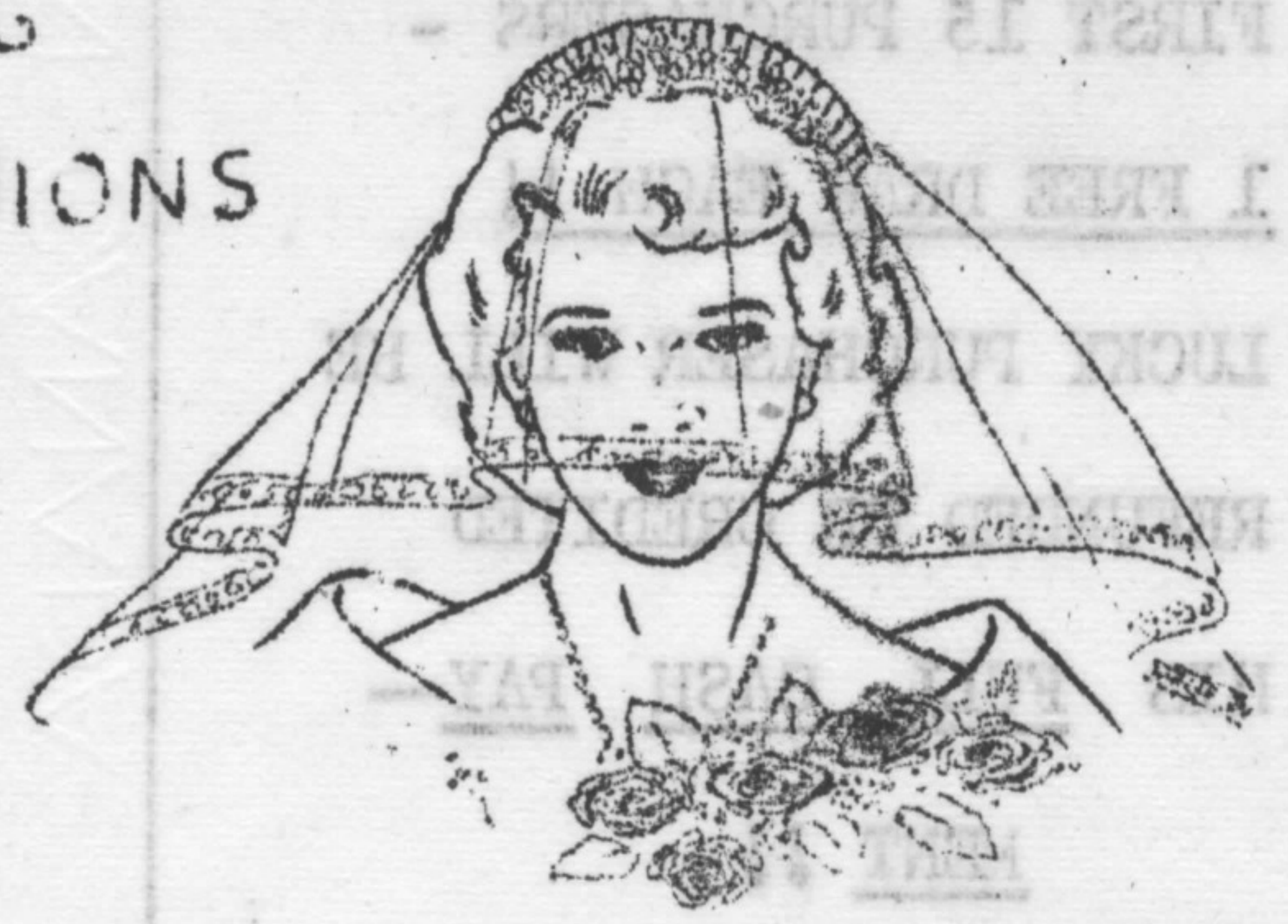
