## COUNCIL QUOTES

A Board of Health meeting preceded the regular meeting of Council Monday evening in the Council Chambers, attended by Reeve J.P. Heenan, Councillors Fraser, Valiquette, Adamo and Wellings, Medical Officer of Health Dr. D.J.M. McCausland, Secretary W.F. Strutt and Clerk W. Hanley.

Dr. McCausland's annual Report met with the approval of Council and he was questioned briefly concerning 1963, and present inspections including TB testing of food handlers, barbers, hairdressers and so forth.

Continuing with the business of Council, the Reeve requested minutes from the Secretary and business arising included reports from all Councillors.

Reeve Heenan presented simplified plans as obtained of the proposed Service Station, Restaurant and Motel-style cabins a Schreiber resident wished to erect within the boundaries of the Township. The plans were not felt to be adequate, and more detail was requested before Council would review them. Council emphasized they did not wish to impede construction of this new enterprise, but the Town's Building Code must be observed.

Councillor Wellings replied to questioning on the proposed expansion of the sewage system. Comparisons and costs were presented and the possibility of further expansion of the Town would be considered before proceeding. Under the present proposal by the Engineer the cost was approximately half the original estimate.

The Municipal District Engineer would be in Terrace Bay at the end of the month and the Reeve recommended the Road Superintendent and Councillor Wellings discuss all problems such as highway parking at that time. Approval of payment for landscaping Kenogami Road was given.

Receipt of an invoice for a Spraying Machine in the amount of \$1,892.50 prompted the Reeve to invite details from Councillor Wellings who had inspected the machine in Toronto. Councillor Wellings described the motor and working capacity of the machine to be used on a half ton truck operated by the driver, or portable for hard to get at places, either with insecticides or herbicides. A demonstration by the manufacturer would be given on the machine's arrival, which would be in a little over a week. The previous spraying and fogging contract had been terminated at a considerable saving; it being estimated the Town could now be thoroughly fogged at a cost of \$80.

Secretary Strutt read the proposed By-Law concerning the Oners System, the Pension plan for Municipal employees, and received the unanimous vote of Council that it become effective June 1, 1963. (Cont'd on Page 8)

## NEW TV TOWER PLANNED BY COMMUNITY SERVICE

Community TV Services wish to announce that, pending Dept. of Transport approval, Construction will begin on a new 240 ft. tower at the present site of our receiving station, on or about July 1st 1963 and will be completed in approximately on month.

Plans call for running three TV Channels immediately, with the possibility of a fourth, plus Radio, at a later date.
