The slogan "Gem of the North Shore" was officially recognized as the descriptive title of Terrace Bay at the January meeting of the Chamber of Commerce.



NOTICE TO TERRACE BAY CITIZENS

The Township Council of Terrace Bay is considering entering into an agreement with the Federal and Provincial Governments to erect a Centennial Project of lasting duration, the cost of which is to be borne equally by the three Governments.
