CENTENNIAL PROJECTS OUTLINED

Eligible projects (in brief) as outlined by the C entennial grants programme include 'any project undertaken by a municipality that will be of lasting nature and will stand as a worthy memorial of Canada's one-hundredth birthday'--with the following types to be considered:

- (a) the acquisition and construction of buildings, parks and other capital works.
- (b) the restoration of buildings of historical or architectural merit.
- (c) the writing and publishing of books--composition of musical works, and creation and completing of paintings and sculpture and other works of art

A project will not be approved unless it can be shown that it has a reasonable prospect of completion by the time of the Centennial observance. A municipality must clearly indicate its plans for permanently maintaining in good condition the completed project before approval will be given to an application.

The act may be read in full at the town office and it is hoped many suggestions will be offered for consideration by council.

The above does not refer to any celebration of the occasion but the lasting memorial.
