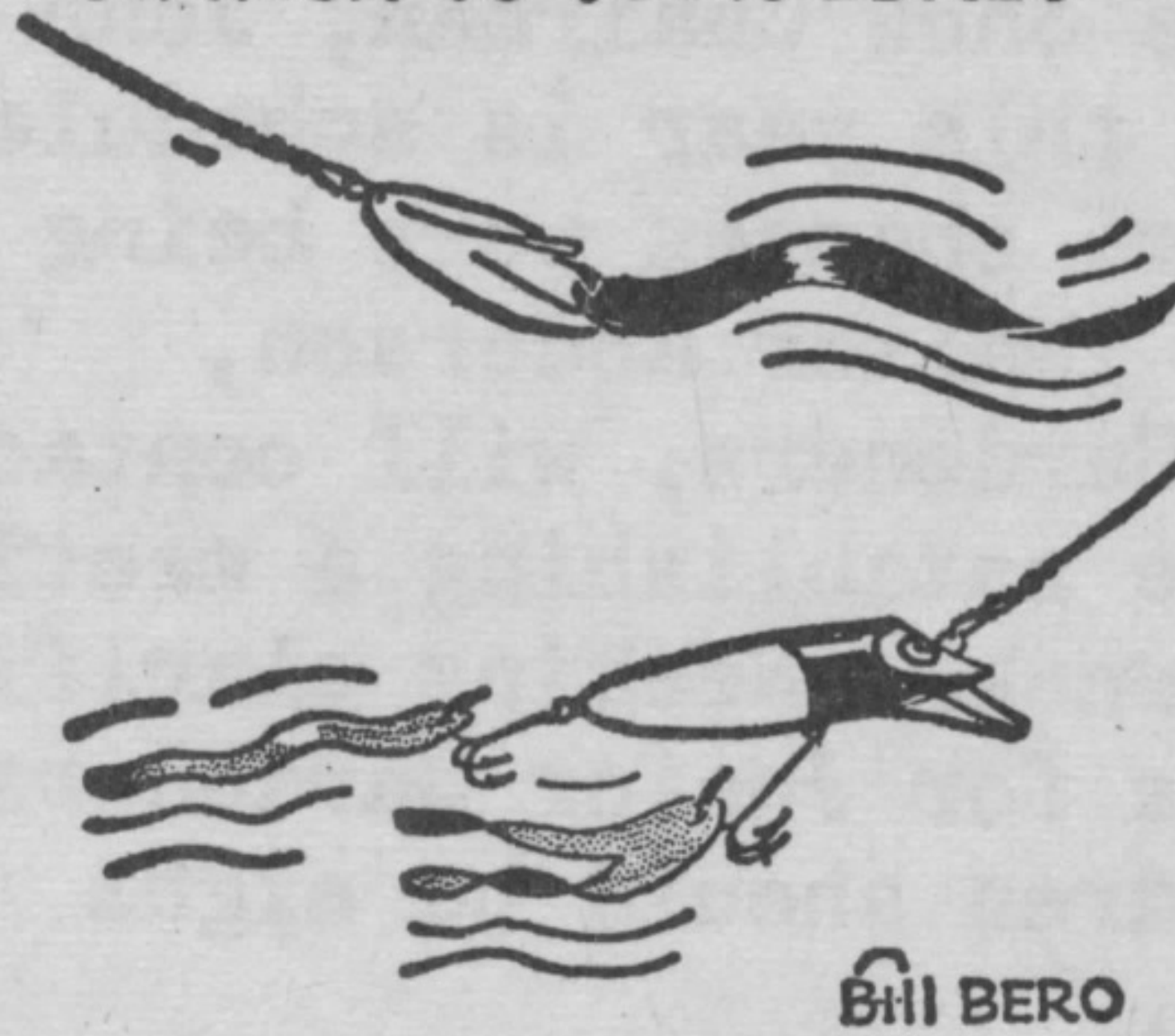

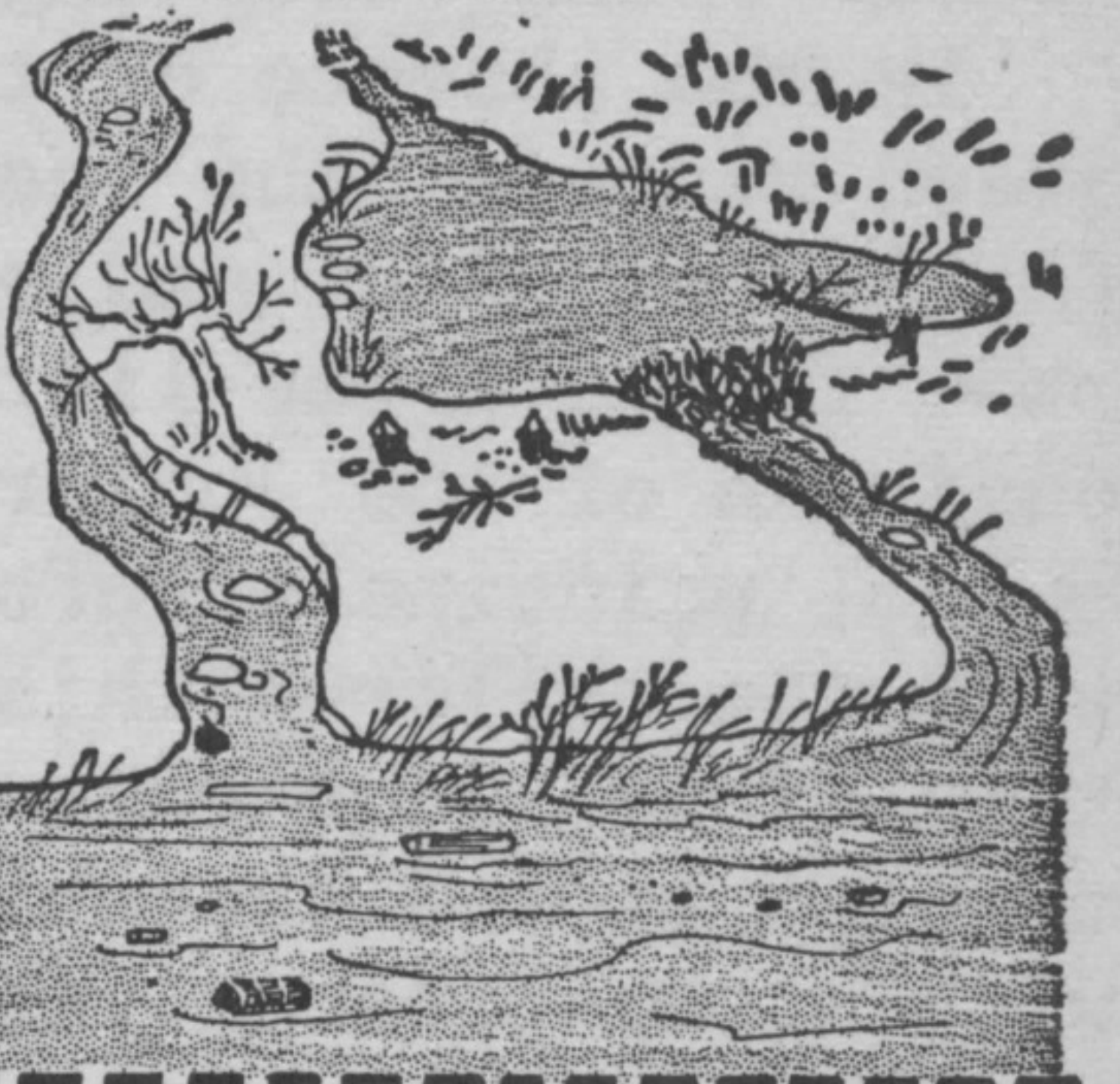
TIPS for the ANGLER

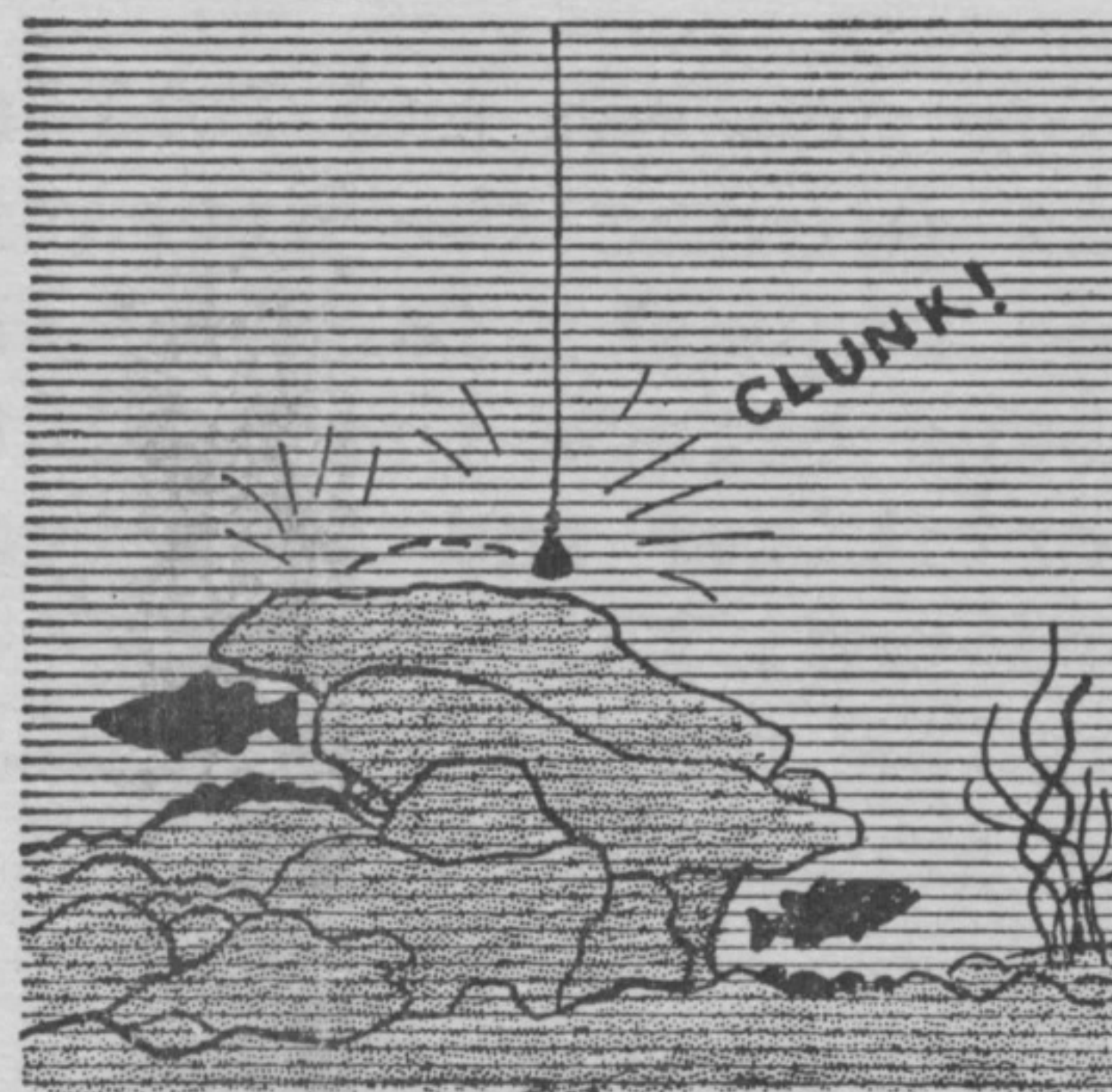

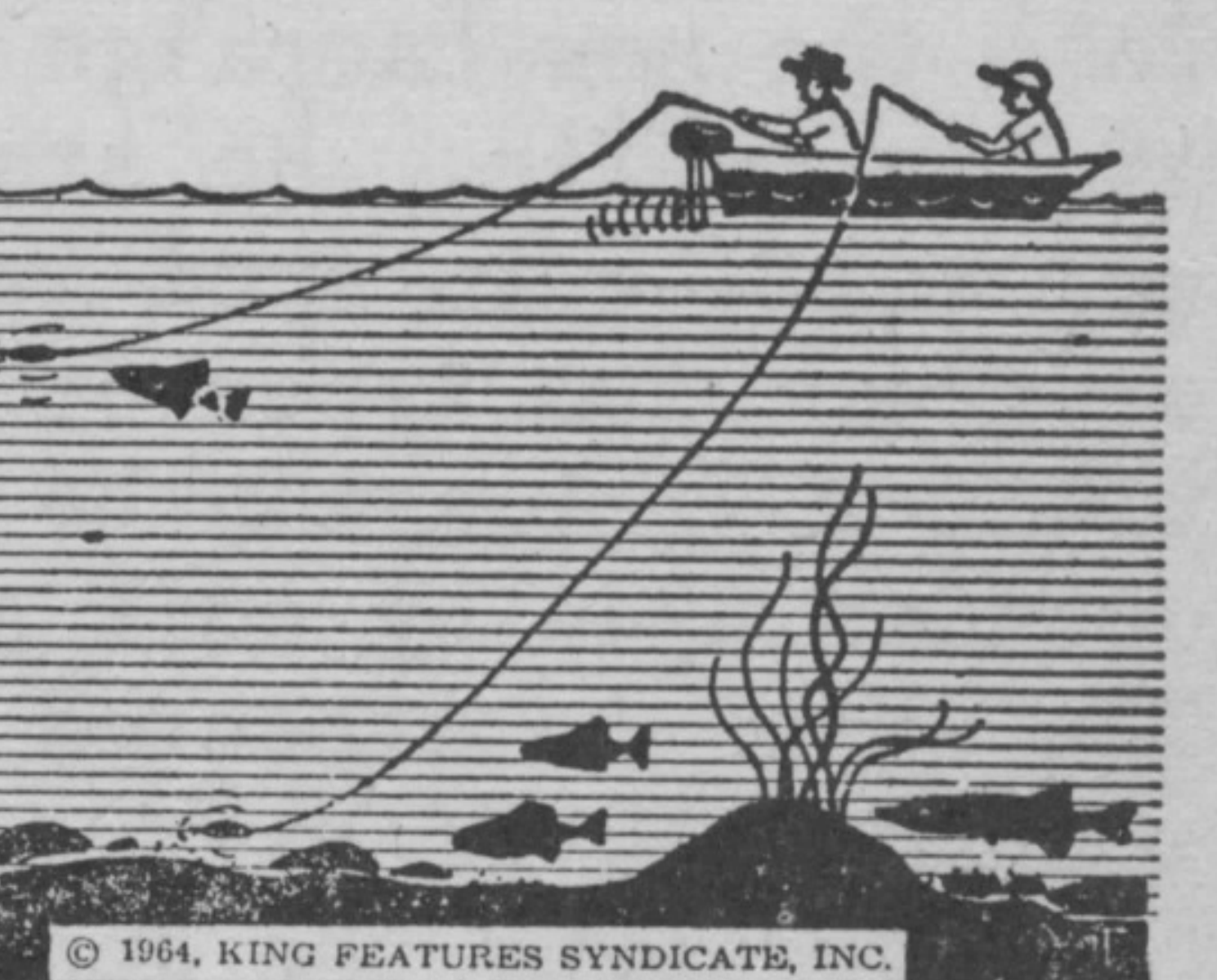
TRY TRIBUTARY STREAMS AND BEAVER DAMS. DURING THE EARLY SPRING HIGH WATER PERIOD.
