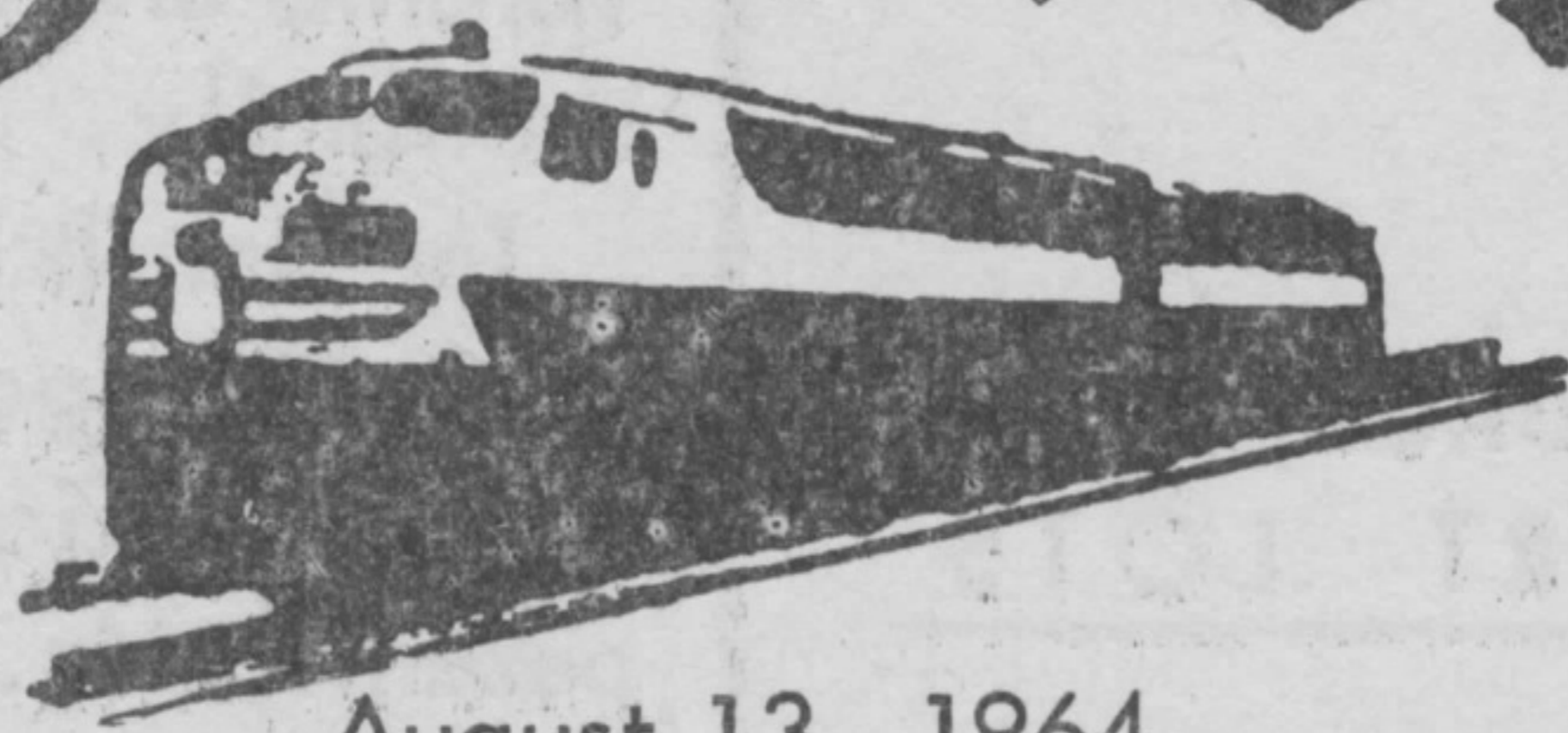

TELEPHONE AND HYDRO SERVICE DISRUPTED

Bell Telephone cables and one Hydro wire were snapped at the corner of Erie and Ontario Streets when the boom on a back hoe on a truck owned and operated by R.
