CANADA SAVINGS BOND CAMPAIGN REPORT

CURFEW LAW TO BE ENFORCED HERE

The Terrace Bay Police Department will enforce the Curfew Act which states "That no child under the age of sixteen years can be on the streets or in any public place after 9:00 p.m. in the evening unless accompanied by a responsible adult.

Anyone caught violating this curfew will be prosecuted.

Parents of children who are allowed to baby-sit or whose children attend gatherings such as Scouts or Guides are asked to phone the Police Office for clarification.
