SCHREIBER PIONEER STRICKEN SUNDAY

The death of Benjamin, George, Henry May, born in London, England on November 15th, 1883, occurred in Terrace Bay on Sunday, February 21st.

Mr. May came to Canada when he was ten years old. He worked in and around the Lindsay district of Southern Ontario, later moving to Fort William where he was employed by the Pigeon River Lumber Company.

During 1906 he moved to Schreiber where he was employed as a locomotive fireman and engineer until his retirement in November, 1948. In 1957 he married May Ellen Knott in Windsor.

Surviving are two sons, Kenneth of Terrace Bay and Douglas of Schreiber, a daughter, Margaret (Mrs. Henry Pinion) of Schreiber and eight grandchildren. He was predeceased by a son in 1933 and by his wife in October 1957. He was a fifty-six year member of Schreiber I.O.O.F. and of Superior Encampment Lodge No. 78, Port Arthur.

The funeral will take place in St. Andrews United Church on Wednesday afternoon.
