lor Thompson in his opinion that this project should be one the Town would not normally do for itself. He noted the erecting of a walk and lookout on the rocks behind the Recreation Centre was within the scope of the allottment, had a lot of potential and as a long range program could be increased as convenient. The entry deadline has been extended to August 5th 1965. Council agreed to hold a special meeting to establish a project before having the Centennial Chairman, Councillor Cavanaugh seek the assistance of Mr. J.W.Reid, Centennial field representative.

Councillor Cavanaugh brought to the attention of Councillor Brown, difficulties encountered during a recent snowstorm, and recommended improvements on snow removal. At the request of Councillor Brown Secretary Strutt read the Parking By-Law and Highways Traffic Act for the clarification of local snow removal

removal problems.

Councillor Brown enguired into the appointments made by Council to the High School Board and was informed one appointtee was at the recommendation of the Public School Board, one from the Separate School Board and the third by Council. A suggestion had been forwarded to increase the Board to five members and upon the recommendation of the Reeve, Councillor Brown would do some research on the subject before the next meeting of Council. Reeve Adamo was informed the Principal could not serve on such a Board. As Chairman of Health and Welfare, Councillor Brown was conferring


with the Medical Officer of Health and School Nurse to arrange a suitable schedule for the School Nurse. Under the present program, no use was being made of the audiometer.

Councillor Thompson reported with the cooperation of Councillors Kolody and Brown a meeting had been arranged to improve the scope of the Snack Bar. He further reported on the progress of selecting a new Recreation Director and hoped to have the vacancy filled by April 1st. vised edition was being prepared and would be presented shortly for Council's approval.
