

OBSCENE LITERATURE (Continued from page 3) only in their physical well-being, or their moral well-being also, and lastly could concern for decent literature extend also to TV programs.

Representatives attending also questioned the right to censor, the defining of obscene, the freedom of the press, and the right to choose, as had their predecessors. They learned no form of censorship is exercised on reading material coming into Ontario, although anyone may report unsolicited material to the Postmaster. The Moderator read the Act & Amendment defining obscene and declaring illegal the sale of same. Concluding, Rev. Inshaw remarked that the emphasis of responsibility appeared to be placed on the home. He expressed the delight of the committee at the encouragement offered from the majority of organizations.

Mr. Cadieux noted the interest shown and extended an invitation to the next general meeting to be scheduled. Father Cano concluded with prayer and the meeting had opened with a prayer by Rev. Husser. Coffee and donuts were served by Knights of Columbus after the program closed.

BRIDE-ELECT HONORED

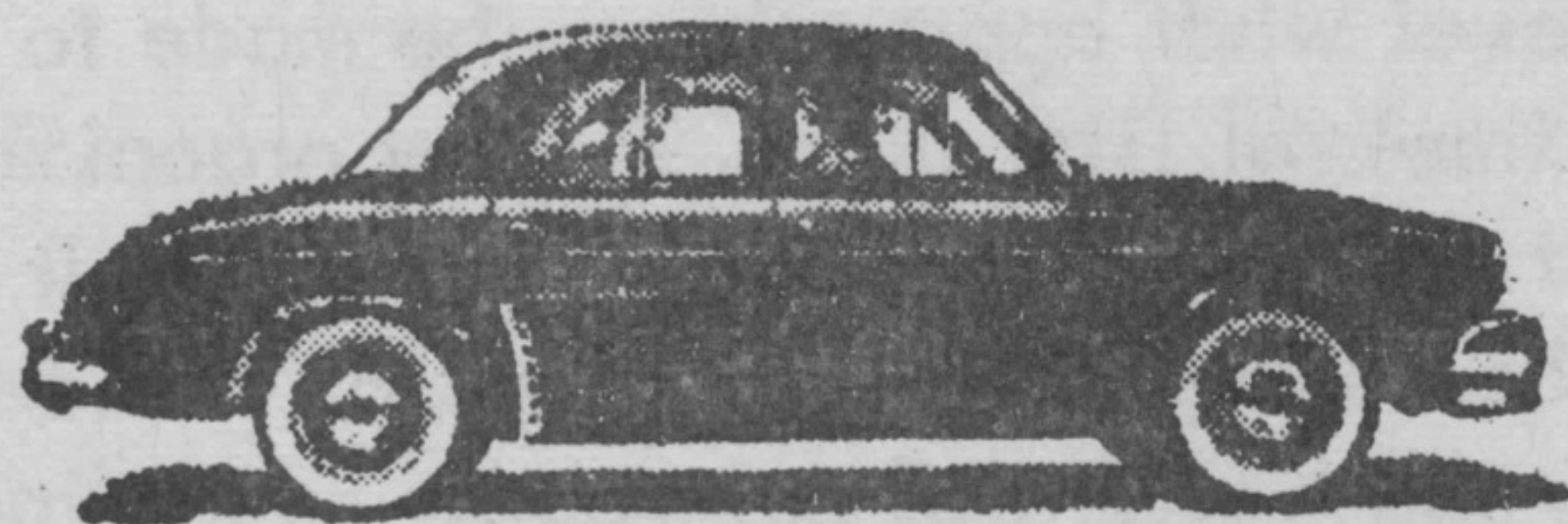
The home of Mrs. C. Bougie was the scene of a pretty bridal shower last Wednesday evening in honour of bride-elect Miss Joan Hopper.
