Man Feared Drowned

Ontario Provincial Police at Nipigon are dragging Barbara Lake, 40 miles northeast of Nipigon, searching for a 27-year-old Terrace Bay man believed drowned Saturday.

OPP report that Donald Tees and Reginald Payette, both of Terrace Bay, were fishing on the lake Saturday and about 3:30 p.m. when water became rough their 13-foot boat capsized. Both clung to the overturned boat for a while but Tees apparently slipped off into the frigid water.

Payette is reported to have

blacked out about that time and remembers nothing until he was picked up from the boat by another party of fishermen about 6:30 p.m.

Payette was apparently so stiff when rescued he couldn't

bend his body.

A search was organized Saturday night for Tees, but nothing was turned up. Payette stayed overnight at a nearby cabin where he was warmed by his rescuers.

He was examined at Nipigon hospital Sunday and found in good condition.
