The bride, given in marriage by her father, was gowned in a full length sheath of silk ligoda with rounded neckline and lily pointed sleeves. Sprays of deep re-embroidered lace appliques enhanced the bodice and banded the hemline. A detachable cathedral train, caught by a bow, fell from the waist. Her bouffant four-tiered shoulder length veil of silk illusion featured scalloped edges and was caught to an organza and seed pearl floral headpiece. She carried a crescent of American Beauty roses.
