distribution good and bidding led to this four heart contract being bid and made in a recent match point game held at the Mount Baker Bridge Club in Cranbrook, B.C. The bidding shows good sense by the North-South pair as it was using minimum responses to show 12 to 16 point hands. North opens his four-card minor, South responds his good heart suit. At this point many players in North would jump immediately to game or would jump to three hearts with 15 points. But both of these bids are clearly incorrect for 15 points is still a minimum hand. If South only had six points and a five-card heart suit, he would still respond one heart to one diamond. A jump response would encourage slam and would convey false information about the hand. The simple raise of the heart suit is excellent, for South can say to himself, "my partner has from 13 to 16 points and at least three This information is hearts." vital for South counts a maximum 16 and his own 14 points, rules out slam and bids the game. An interesting sidelight to the hand is the fact that 3NT can be made but only realizes 630 points whereas Four Hearts makes five and a score of 650.
