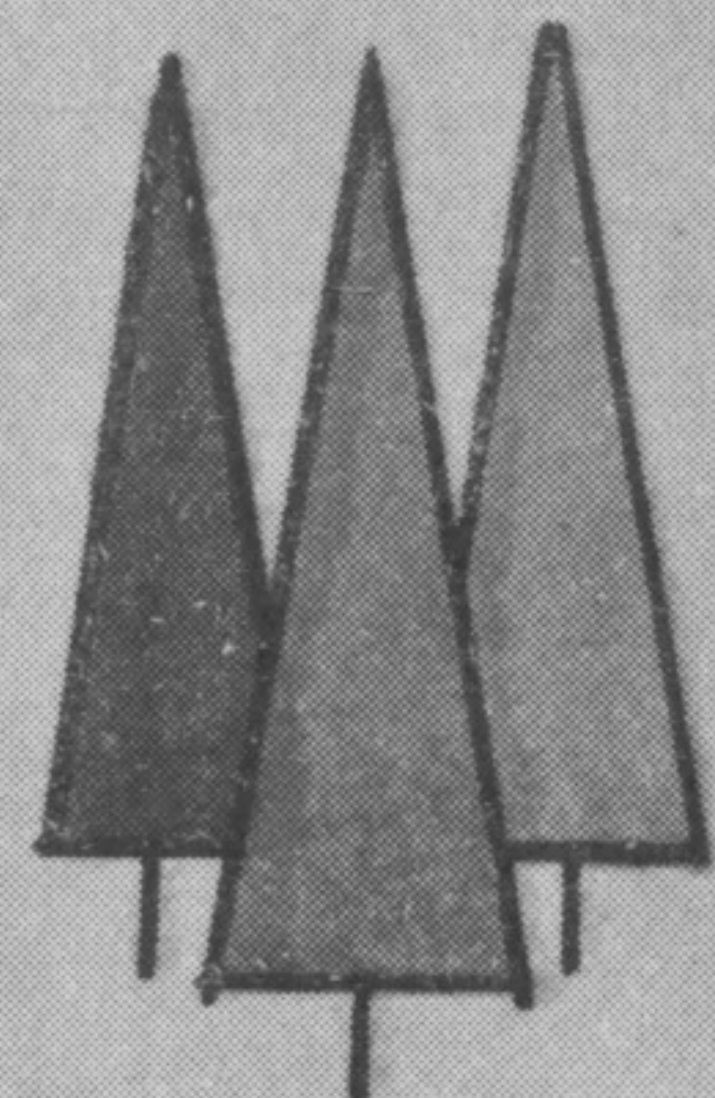

REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICES NOVEMBER 11TH

Branch 223 of the Royal Canadian Legion, Terrace Bay will again sponsor a Remembrance Day Parade, banquet and social on Friday, November 11th. All Legionnaires and Veterans are requested to be at the Recreation Centre at 10.45 a.m. to form up for the Parade. Poppies and Medals are the order of the day.

TERRACE BAY STOP-OVER FOR VOYAGEUR TRIP

Evidence that Centennial preparations will affect communities throughout Canada was brought a little closer to the district over the weekend when John Mitchell, Ontario commodore of the voyageur canoe trip which will start off from Rocky Mountain House in Alberta on May 24, 1967 and travel 3283 miles, made stops in Rosspoint, Terrace Bay and Schreiber.

The ten canoes taking part in the Marathon paddling feat will be sponsored jointly by various provincial governments and the Centennial Commission. The six paddlers in each canoe will wear colourful voyageur costumes and at the many stop-overs enroute they hope to meet and speak with people who at one time resided in their particular province or district.
