IMPORTANT NOTICE TO MOTORISTS

Effective January 1, 1967, a passenger in a motor vehicle, who is not paying a fare for passage, will have the right to claim damages from the driver and/or owner of the vehicle if he's injured in an accident caused by the driver's gross negligence. (There will be no change in the law affecting fare-paying passengers, who will continue to have the right to claim damages.)

The insurance industry advises that almost all automobile liability insurance policies now in effect include coverage against this new risk. However, all motor vehicle owners, and particularly motorcycle owners, are urged to check their policies to make sure that passenger hazard coverage is included. If there is any doubt you should check with your automobile insurance agent.
