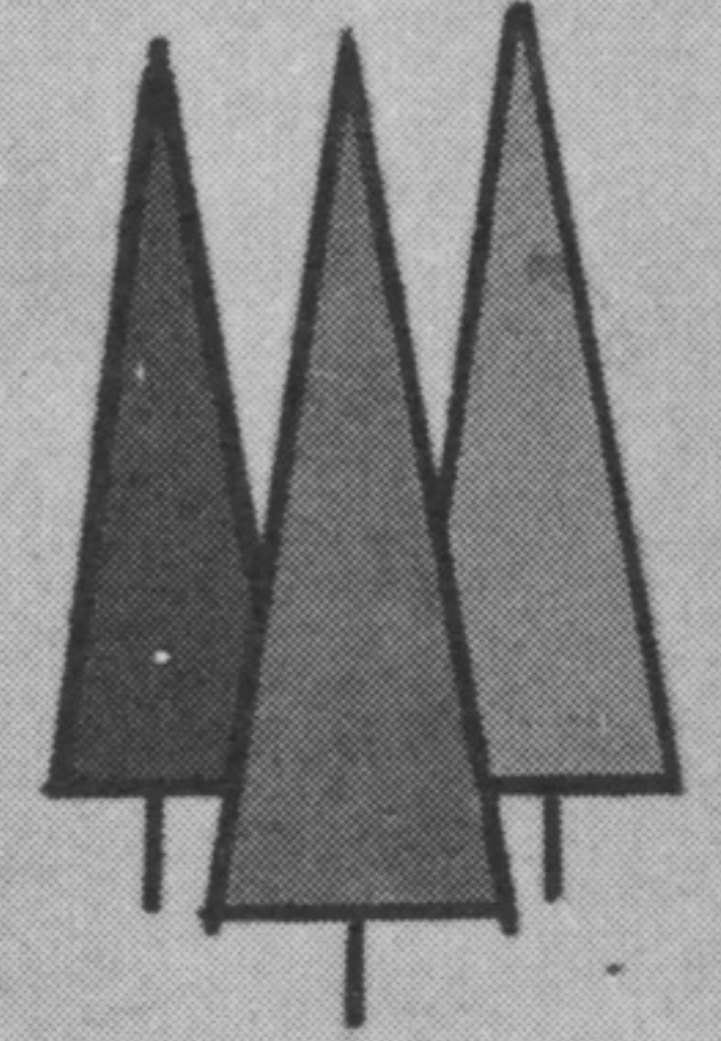

They sang Father Jean de Brebeuf's Huron Carol and It Came Upon A Midnight Clear. Dressed in white choir gowns a small group conducted by Mr. D. Davey sang Christmas Hymn and Joy To The World. The combined Public School Choirs ended their part of the program with We Three Kings Of Orient Are with solo parts sung by Ralph Fraser, James Gerlach and Mark Papousek.
