West opened the bidding with a pre-emptive bid of three clubs to shut out a possible game try by the opponents. This type of bid is very useful if the opposition is vulnerable and if their strength is divided between the two hands. South looked again at his heart suit and decided his side should have the bid. North's raise to game is excellent as he has two outside aces and a possible club ruff for partner. The club king is led, East overtaking and returning the suit showing a doubleton. West wins the second club and leads his knave at trick three. South, a keen player, recognizes the doubleton in East and sees a definite loser in diamonds later on. A ruff on the board would only be overruffed by East at trick three whereas the low diamond rids his hands of a potential loser. The general term for this play is Loser-on-Loser and this example is a called the specialized form transferred ruff as South is transferring a potential loser to a later ruffing situation.
