The Terrace Bay High School Auditorium was filled for matinee and evening performances of "The Tinderbox" based on the fairy tale by Hans Christian Anderson and adapted by Dorothy Jane Goulding.

Sponsored by the local Centennial Committee, the Toronto Museum Children's Theatre appeared as part of the Ontario Centennial Commission's plan to present plays throughout the province.

The "hero" played by William Copeland of the Canadian Opera Company, proved an excellent foil for the charming petite princess, Marilyn Moyer of Winnipeg. The "Queen" who was also a witch was ably portrayed by Patricia Grant of Glasgow. "Rover" the lovable canine hero was played by Robert Aaron, while the chorus of soldiers and "ladies-in-waiting" were Hamish, Robertson, Jim Timmins, Richard Ayres and Gregory Winkfield.

Mr. Winkfield the guitar accompanist is well known as a folk singer as well as an actor. In charge of lighting was Jim James, while Lin Weston took care of costumes with Sandy Moore and John Stam, stage managers.
