Detachment Commander Corp. M. Kulmatycki of Schreiber O.P.P. reports a total 264 duty hours served with 3,161 miles patrolled from April 30 to May 6. Two property damage accidents were reported. 43 vehicles were given safety checks, 19 motorists warned, and 8 charges laid under Ontario Highway Traffic Act. 5 transients were given meal tickets from Schreiber Transient and Welfare Fund.

May 7 to 13 - a total of 184 duty hours served with 3525 miles patrolled. One theft investigated, one break and entry and one other investigation conducted. Three property damages reported with accidents amounting to \$1,420. Fifty-six vehicles given safety checks, 18 motorists warned, 7 charges laid under the Ontario Highway Traffic Act.
