DROWNING AVERTED-From Page 4 Fortunately, a mile and a half from, and also making for the Slates, were Archie Heinrich and Raoul Cormier in Archie's 15 ft. boat. Something prompted Archie to turn round and check on the Desaulniers' boat. He could see nothing but a bobbing life jacket and immediately turned around and headed for the rescue. He found the whole party all wearing lifejackets clinging to the boat. As they had been ten minutes in the icy water, Archie made speed back to the shelter of the mouth of the Aguasabon River. Only two hours after they left they were safely home, wet, shaken but alive. Thanks to the prompt action of Mr. Heinrich and attention to water safety rules by Mr. Desaulniers, a near tragedy was averted. The following day a four hour effort resulted in recovery of the boat, twin motors, gas, food, and other gear. The only loss being some camping gear which was carried loose in the boat. The incident stressed the importance of observing water safety rules at all times
