combat display by a team from the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. They demonstrated ability to disarm protagonists armed with pistols, knives and clubs, using only their bare hands. Judo throws and falls were also part of the program.

Of greater appeal to the younger folk, though rather hard on the ears, was the triple salute to the flag when on command from the Guard Commander Lieutenant R.J.M. Selman, the guard fired their

weapons individually a split second after one another. Watching, one could see the flash travel along first the front rank and then the rear - a most impressive performance.

Marching and arms drill demonstrated the strict discipline essential in time of action. Highly impressive was the marching band. The commentary dwelt on traditions and history of the Army still having a place in modern training schedules, and the combination of old and new, discipline and comedy, as in the unarmed combat display when three "toughies" attacked a "poor old man" to find themselves biting the dust in a matter of seconds!

The program was truly a memorable one.

Heard on 94.3mhz, F-M radio provides a program of good listening music, local, national and international news plus a moderate amount of restrained advertising. It has become the policy of CKPR-FM to beam their programs outside the Lakehead area, in order to provide a radio service to the district extending from Atikokan to White River and north to Geraldton.

Through facilities provided by Community Television Services it is possible for about 80% of the homes in the district to receive FM programming. With such a large potential audience it is in the interests of all to participate in promoting the communities through radio programming.

Listeners will be able to turn to their FM channel to hear news, community events, club projects and promotions from Terrace Bay and Schreiber.
