The Ontario Department of Transport recently announced - a new resident to Ontario, who holds a valid driver's licence issued by another province in Canada (not to include the Territories) may obtain an Ontario driver's license without examination.

To do this the person applying must provide an Ontario address, surrender a valid driver's licence issued by the other province and pay the fee for an original driver's licence. These regulations apply to both the automobile and/or the motorcycle licence holder.
