#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

A recent communique from R.K. Andras, Liberal M.P. for Port Arthur reads in part -

It is paradoxical that in the midst of celebrations of our Gentennial Year, Canadians are facing grave questions affecting national unity - the answers to which will determine our ability to survive as a united Canada. There are several divisive factors: federal provincial jurisdictional problems, regionalism, isolationism, disparities in economic growth, but the most serious is that of English-French relations.

This English-French problem has been with us for one hundred years as a smouldering fire. Recent events -- the "Quiet Revolution" in Quebec -- have fanned that fire into a near halocaust. Outside Quebec, reaction to the increasing desire by French speaking Canadians for greater opportunity, and equality in Confederation, has ranged from bitter resentment to indifference and apathy. Such reactions, in turn, result in adverse reaction amongst the French speaking Canadians, and entice even the moderates among them to more extremism. These kinds of exchanges, steming so much from misunderstanding and lack of communications, are contributing heavily to the current crisis. For these reasons, I have accepted an invitation to bring a panel of my colleagues from the House of Commons of Port Arthur, to debate, discuss and answer questions about the issue. We will appear on CKPR television at 6.30 to 7.00 p.m. November 13 and 10.30 to 11 p.m. November 14 at a public meeting at the Lakehead University, starting at 8 p.m. on November 13 on open-line radio programs the morning of November 14, and probably at other gatherings during those two days. Accompanying me will be Mr. Grant Deachman M.P. Vancouver-Quadra, Mr. Ovide Laflamme M.P. Quebec-Montmorency, and Parliementary Secretary to the Registrar-General, Mr. Bryce Mackasey M.P. Verdun, Quebec and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Labour. Whatever your views are, I invite you to listen to the debates, and to join us at the meetings. Your questions
