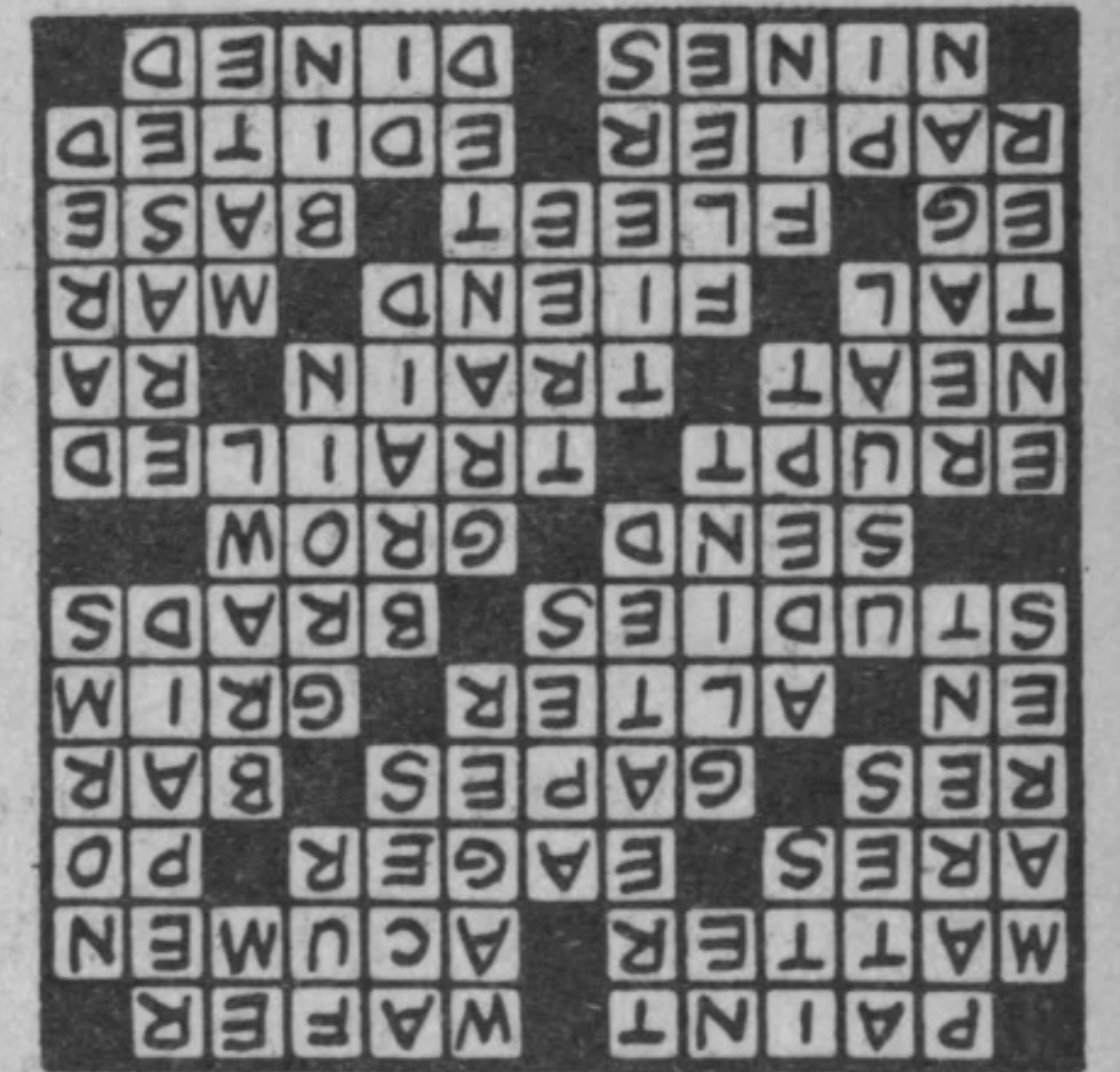
He is a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, serving as local secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Pacific Grievance Committee.
