☞ A PLAYGOER WAS ONE of an audience at *Anne of Green Gables* on a Monday and on a Tuesday viewed a CBC TV program about the permissive society of London, England, a permissiveness that, according to the documentary, is mirrored in the theatre.

At the play men, women and children, and they filled every seat in the theatre, so entered into that childhood classic that they were reduced to tears, sobbing, nose blowing and throat clearing. IT'S EASY TO GET PHOTOS OF CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

Each year, more people are decorating their houses with colorful Christmas lights and floods. And, like most people you've probably spent a lot of time and effort making the outside of your home as festive as the inside for the holiday season.

Have you ever wished you could take color photos of your house and others in your neighborhood? Well you can, and it's much easier than you may think. You'll need a camera capable of making time exposures, a tripod or some other solid support for the camera and a fast color film such as high speed Ektachrome, preferably Type B. (indoor).

Your only problem is calculating what basic exposure to use when this is decided, "bracket" by taking two extra pictures at greater and lesser exposures. For example, if you decide your exposure should be 4 secs. at f/8 take one at that setting, one at 1 sec. and another 16 secs. Using a range like this, you are

sure to get the results you want. It is pretty well a case of experimenting and keeping a record for future use.

Here's a handy table of basic exposures for various films, for subjects with the usual Christmas lights, Kodachrome II 16 seconds at f/8, Kodachrome-X, Ektachrome-X, Kodacolor-X: 8 seconds at f/8, and high speed Ektachrome: 4 seconds at f/8

If you are using a non-adjustable camera which can make time exposures, try Kodacolor-X and an exposure of 20 seconds. Naturally, when you are taking time-exposures, you should use a tripod or rest the camera on a steady object during the exposure to avoid blurring. When there is a breeze strong enough to move trees, shrubs or lights, or when it is snowing you shouldn't try to take pictures.

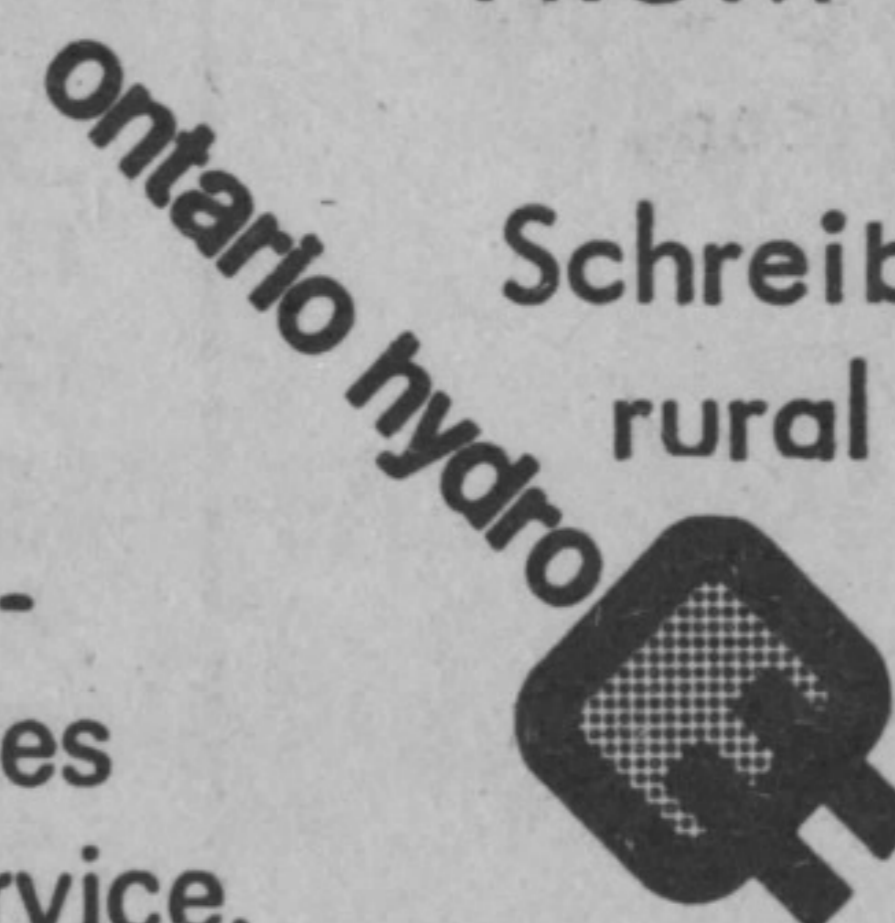
