This reporter has fastidiously talked to, overheard, read, and listened to hockey players oratorically giving their views regarding the pros and cons of wearing a helmet to earn a living.

The upshot of this latest outcry resulted from a tragedy. It is indeed a puzzling and frustrating world when a death has to be the key to unlock the door of common sense.

Bill Masterton died from injury received in a game between his Minnesota North Stars club and the Oakland Seals. The general concept of the tragedy is now that it might have been avoided IF Masterton was wearing a helmet.

Following are a host of comments from National Hockey League players and executive explaining their personal views on the use of helmets in hockey.

NHL president Clarence Campbell said: "Masterton's death was a normal hazard of our business. The very best helmets that money can buy are made available by the team if the players want them. Some players just won't wear them."

Gordie Howe: "No, I won't wear a helmet, but I'd recommend youngsters wear them."

Bobby Hull: "The reason we don't wear helmets is vanity, that's all. After this I'm going to take a very careful look at the possibility of wearing a helmet."

Stan Mikita: "I'll be wearing a helmet as soon as I can find a good one. And to be sure it's right for me, I'm working on my own design.

J. C. Tremblay: "I've been hit can the head only once since I've been wearing a helmet, but I'd never take it off now. I've only got one head and I'm going to keep protecting it."

Pierre Pilote: "I guess I'm too old to wear one now. But I think they're a good idea. When I'm instructing at hockey school and a kid comes without a helmet, I ask him what's going on."

Dave Balon, who used to be a linemate of Masterton's: "I talked to my wife before the season and told her I would wear a helmet. But when I came to training camp there was only one helmet around and I didn't claim it."

Hap Emms, owner and general manager of Niagara Falls Flyers in the Ontario Junior A Hockey League has ordered all of his players to wear helmets. The same now goes for the Peterboro Petes of the same league.

Frank Mahovlich says he "would wear a helmet tomorrow if ordered to do so" by his employers:

Wren Blair of the Minnesota North Stars: "I think helmets are a good idea for amateur players. Pros are putting on entertainment and part of the artistic appeal is being close to the players and seeing their faces."

One NHL'er told me that he is positive 95 percent of the players would wear helmets if a suggestion was put forth.

Hockey players wear pounds of protective material from their shoulders to ankles. Yet, they leave the most important part of their anatomy open for wounds, be they minor or serious.
