Mrs. Jean Shaw of Fort William was the guest of Mrs. Art Moorey last week.

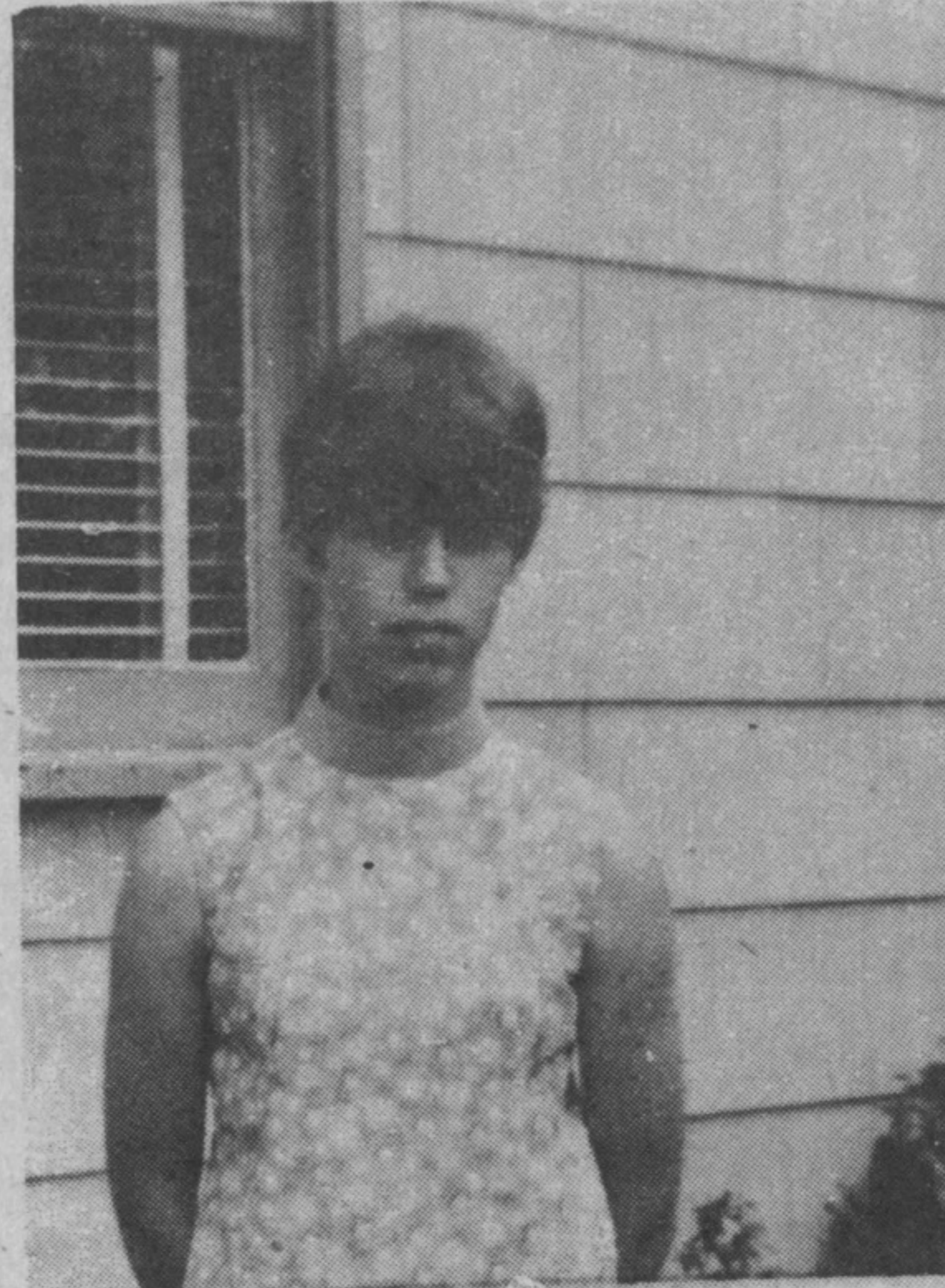
Cathy LeBlanc is visiting her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Mykichuk in Winnipeg.
