the shuttle 400 times. Of these 400 strokes, 150 would be full arm swings of a racquet whose weight is anywhere from 3.7 to 5 ounces (that is more than many major league pitchers would throw in the course of a complete game). For good play, one should be and needs to be in good physical condition. Badminton is one of the few sports which requires so much concentration. During the course of a three set tennis match, the ball is not in play more than eight per cent of the time. In football, a game thought so vigorous, the ball is not in actual play much more than fourteen minutes of the two hours or more that the players spend on the field. On the average, a man's game is much more energetic than a woman's game as is the case in a wide range of sports. In games among top callibre players that shuttle is in play over 50 per cent of the total

game!

Doubles and mixed doubles games provide a striking contrast to singles. The game becomes rather choppy and the pace is quickened as the shuttle is continually being "cut off". It provides very intense excitement for spectators. It is a game suitable for Canadian weather, played by young & old alike.
