The following is a letter printed in the Montreal newspaper: Dear Sir, -

I recently returned with a friend after a hitch-hiking trip to Vancouver. At times we were made to feel like criminals.

At Lake Louise all the campsites were full. The R.C.M.P. wouldn't let us sleep in the jail and wouldn't let us use the lawn in the rear. We were told we would get 60 days if found sleeping anywhere in the town outside a hotel, which we couldn't afford We were told we could sleep outside the town limits, off the highway.

At Terrace Bay, Ontario, the police would have let us use the jail if they had had one, but instead dro drove us to the CPR station giving us permission to sleep there. One even offered to drive us to a lookout point the following day. In Blind River we slept on the sidewalk outside a supermarket. The OPP checked our identity and then checked every few hours to make sure we weren't being bothered.

Despite the attitude at Lake Louise, which is the most beautiful lake I have ever seen, the trip made me proud to be a Canadian.
