KIMBERLY-CLARK HOST TO SAFETY ASSOCIATION

On Thursday, October 17th, the Kimberly-Clark Pulp & Paper Co. will host the Northwestern Branch meeting of the Ontario pulp and Paper Makers Safety Association.

Approximately 60 delegates representing the pulp and paper industry in Northwestern Ontario, from Marathon in the east to Kenora and Fort Frances in the west, will meet to discuss various aspects of industrial safety.

Participating in the program will be Mr. F. Soughton, Training Co-ordinator Kimberly-Clark, who will lead a group discussion examining the accident prevention activities in these plants. Mr. Bert Travis of the Construction Safety Association, Toronto, will speak on the subject of Fire Prevention. Mr. Dick Whent, Safety Supervisor Domtar Newsprint Red Rock will discuss the merits of crew safety meetings.

In the evening, the visiting delegates will attend a banquet at the Terrace Bay Motor Hotel at which time Mr. R.G. Ison, Safety Consultant, Kimberly-Clark Corporation Neenah, will be the guest speaker.

Jack Stokes, MPP Thunder Bay has learned that Multiply of Nipigon is off to a good start and has excellent prospects for success under new management.

Vice-President Murray Atkinson and the Board of Directors made up of local business men from the Nipigan, Red Rock area are to be congratulated on their initiative and enterprise in getting this plant back into production.

Mr. Atkinson advises that the mill is operating on a two shift basis employing 60 people in the plant and 10 office personell. Market conditions are favourable with the balance of 1968 production already sold. Kingsway Lumber of Toronto is acting as marketing agent.

Timber contracts have been signed with Domtar, Abitibi and Great Lakes so wood supplies are no longer a problem. Employee morale has never been better and a contract recently negotiated is awaiting ratification by both parties.

The re-opening of Multiply will have a favourable effect on the economy of Nipigon and will do much to impress upon Government that we can develop and sustain secondary industry in this area.
