

CLEMENS - HAMILTON NUPTIALS

A blue and white theme was chosen by Janet Eva Clemens of Schreiber for her wedding on October 12th at 4 p.m. in St. Andrew's United Church, when she became the bride of Ronald William Hamilton of Schreiber.

Pastel gladioli centred in blue formed a floral background and white satin bows marked the guest pews for the double ring ceremony at which Rev. E.C. Prinselaar officiated.

Miss Donna Slater of Port Arthur was soloist and was accompanied at the organ by Miss Wendy Weaver of Schreiber.

The bride is the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Clemens of Schreiber and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D.Q. Hamilton, Schreiber.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a formal gown of white peau de soie designed by herself. The empire bodice featured a bateau neckline and elbow-length sleeves accented by a wide band of Alencon lace. Similar lace bordered the hem of the full-length skirt and the detachable train of peau de soie which fell softly from the waist. Her tiered bouffant veil of French illusion was caught by a white floral cluster and she carried a cascade of red roses and lily of the valley.
