TAR-NICOTINE STUDY (from Page 3A)

The smoker can reduce his intake of cigarette smoke by reducing the amount of smoke he inhales or by - lengthening the period between cigarettes, lengthening the period between puffs, not inhaling, removing the cigarette from the mouth after each puff, throwing away a long butt - tar and nicotine collects in the tobacco as the cigarette is smoked and the shorter the cigarette is puffed the more concentrated the tar and nicotine in the smoke becomes. Of course, the most effective way is - not to smoke. A complete list of tar and nicotine contents in cigarettes available in Canada is at the NEWS office for those interested.

HOW TO CLEAN SUEDE - A tip from a Spanish couturier in suede and leather in Canada recently reported that the best way to clean quality suede apparel is to take a piece of matching suede, moisten it with lighter fluid and gently rub soiled or spotted areas. Success, however, depends on the quality of the suede and the dye used to give it color. Inferior skins or dyes might lose color.
