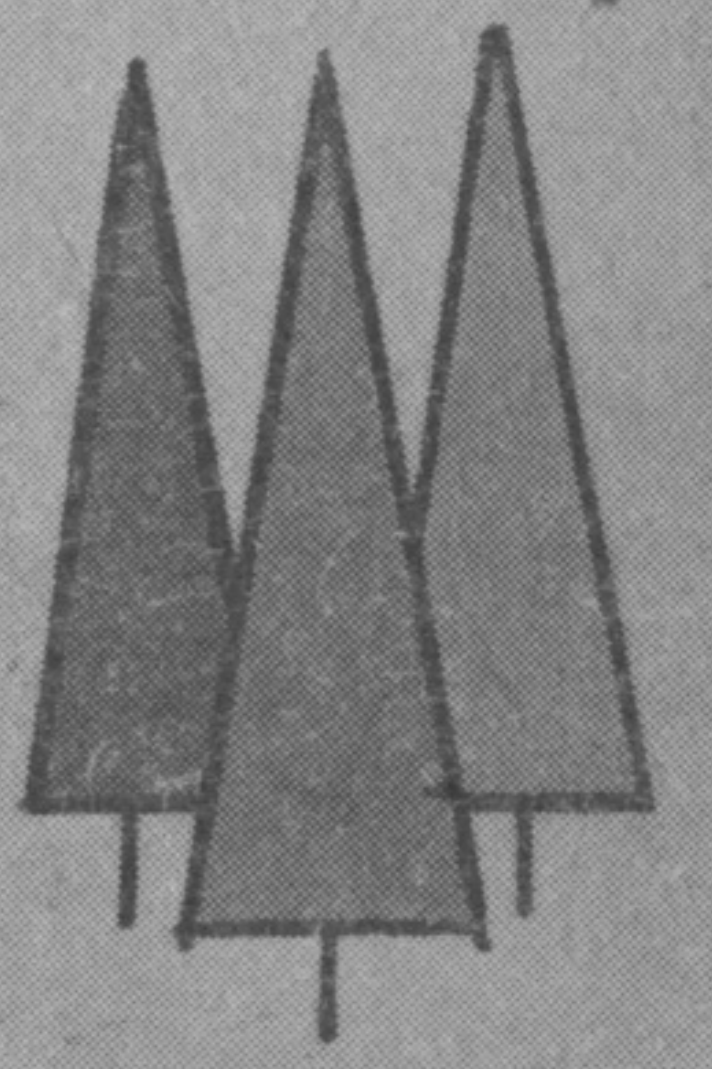

## W.E. CAVANAUGH RE-ELECTED

An excellent 73.3% of Terrace Bay voters turned out on Monday, December 2nd. to cast their votes for candidates to municipal office and the newly formed Regional School Boards.

Straight forward voting for Reeve and Councillors ( a two year term) resulted in W.E. Cavanaugh being re-elected with 234 votes. Runner-up was W. Adamo with 128. R. Sinotte followed with 107 and P. Romanuk had 78. J. Caccamo headed the polls with 442 recorded votes. A new comer to Municipal politics W. Farrell was next with 440. R. Bray had 417 votes, D. Desrosier 403 and A.Allen 285.

Representatives elected to the Schreiber, Terrace Bay Separate School Board are Mrs. M. Bouchard, Mrs. M. Helmink, M. Nicol, G. Ramsey and Frank Sechesky for Terrace Bay with G.V. Bourke, J.T. Power and D. McGuire representing Schreiber.

A. Chisholm, and T. Dorland will represent Public School supporters on the Lake Superior Divisional School Board, Marathon representatives are Mrs. O. Donaldson, R. Unger, J. Warwick and K. Beasley. Manitouwadge elected P. McLeod, R.R. Wainwright, Marilyn Beacom (continued on Page 11)

In the October 26th issue of the Port Arthur News Chronicle and Fort William Daily Times Journal Weekend Magazine page 3, there appears this flat statement" "If you are still doggedly paddling past

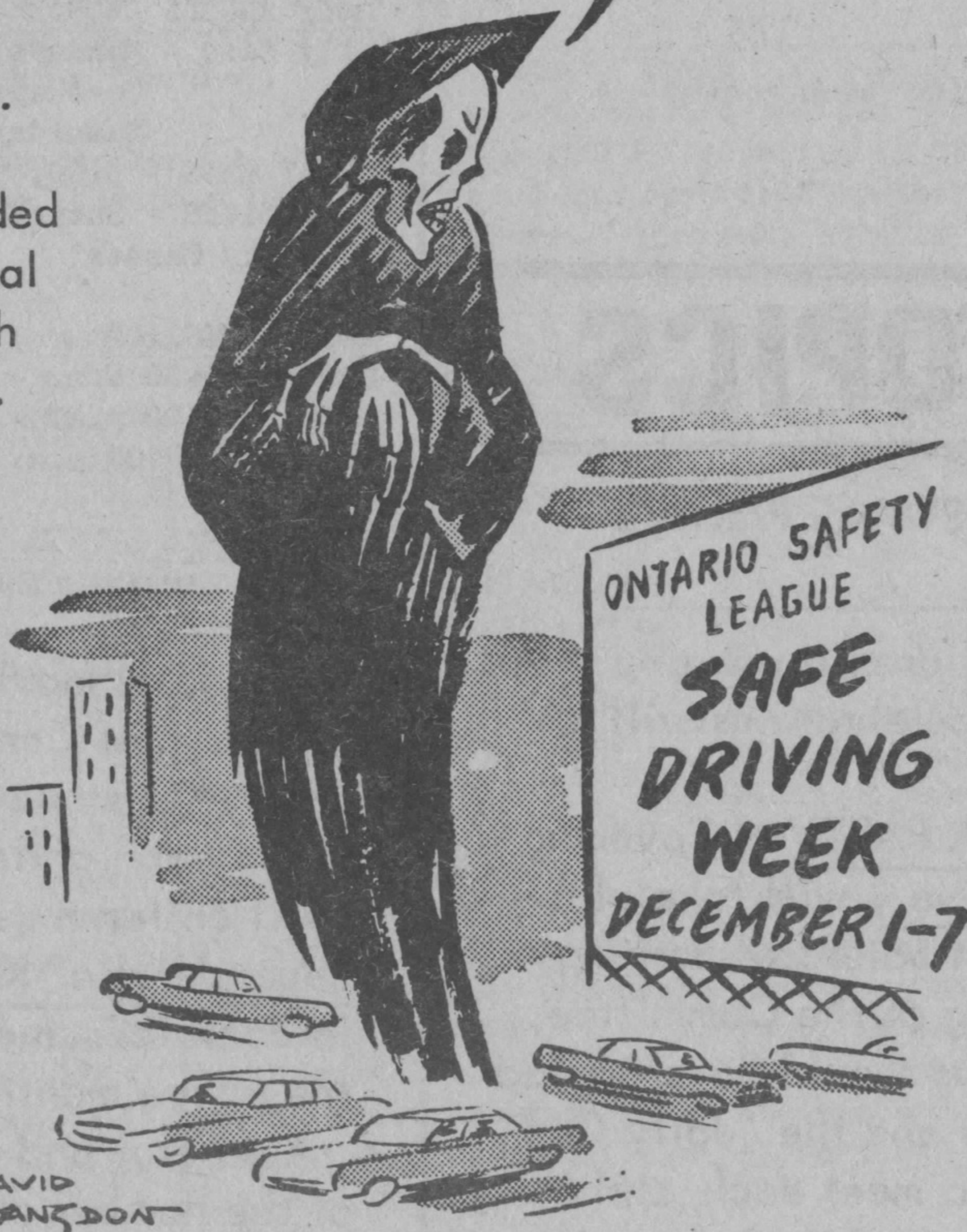
Terrace Bay on Lake Superior where pulp mill wastes have completely ruined the local water you will reach the Winnipeg River near Kenora, Ontario."

Statements such as this reveal an appalling ignorance and disregard of facts. To enable residents of Terrace Bay to refute this trend in reporting, which this year appears to be fashionable, we offer you the following information -

During the early stages of planning of this mill, 1946-47 the potential problems of effluent or sewage control were recognized. For this reason land was purchased from the Crown in the vicinity of the mill to handle mill effluent. Taking advantage of the natural terrain, an effluent system featuring two settling lagoons (Pond A and Pond C) connected by a small creek discharged into Lake Superior at Moberly Bay was put into use immediately
